So the division of developmental disabilities provides the transportation service. 65 00:05:56.038 --> 00:06:06.988 Through our Medicaid waivers, and those Medicaid waivers serve a population of around 15,000 individuals throughout the state of Missouri. 66 00:06:06.988 --> 00:06:13.858 And those are those wavers are there's 4 different waivers. 67 00:06:13.858 --> 00:06:17.999 And it is the comprehensive waiver. 68 00:06:17.999 --> 00:06:25.918 The community support waiver, the partnership for help waiver and then we have the Missouri children with developmental disabilities labor. 69 00:06:25.918 --> 00:06:30.059 We provide transportation through all of those waivers. 70 00:06:30.059 --> 00:06:33.928 As an authorized service and. 71 00:06:33.928 --> 00:06:39.209 All of our services right now are very much experiencing. 72 00:06:39.209 --> 00:06:46.048 And a lot of challenges with access to care. 73 00:06:46.048 --> 00:06:51.988 That is centered around not I think there used to be some challenges. 74 00:06:51.988 --> 00:06:56.639 In access to care on with a division waiting list. 75 00:06:56.639 --> 00:06:59.908 And so that really was. 76 00:06:59.908 --> 00:07:04.978

Individuals who were looking for entry into a waiver. 77 00:07:04.978 --> 00:07:09.389 And they were looking for services. 78 00:07:09.389 --> 00:07:14.459 That they needed a slot within a waiver in order to access the services. 79 00:07:14.459 --> 00:07:20.848 So, for the past 2 years, coming up, with 12 years, the division has not had. 80 00:07:20.848 --> 00:07:24.509 A waiting list for waiver slots they. 81 00:07:24.509 --> 00:07:35.038 State general assembly, um, with the governor support has funded waiver slots for all of those individuals speaking access to the services. 82 00:07:35.038 --> 00:07:39.869 And we've been able to not have a waiting list as far as. 83 00:07:39.869 --> 00:07:46.348 Individuals wanting to enter the waiver, however, as we have. 84 00:07:46.348 --> 00:07:50.968 Experienced the current economic condition kind of. 8.5 00:07:50.968 --> 00:07:56.908 Um, combined with rates that have not been funded and kept up with. 86 00:07:56.908 --> 00:07:59.908 Are the. 87 00:07:59.908 --> 00:08:06.178 Increased cost of living we have come to a point where. 88 00:08:06.178 --> 00:08:09.389 There are access to care issues for individuals. 89 00:08:09.389 --> 00:08:17.939

Who are approved for waiver services they have a waiver slots and they need a service such as residential services. 90 00:08:17.939 --> 00:08:24.569 Or transportation, and there is no provider able to serve them because the providers are not able. 91 00:08:24.569 --> 00:08:35.969 To hire the staff to serve them, or they're not able to afford to pay the staff that they have to keep the staff that they have. And I think that we're seeing this. 92 00:08:35.969 --> 00:08:39.869Kind of just in general in the economic environment right now. 93 00:08:39.869 --> 00:08:43.288 Um, 1 of the things I know we're all. 94 00:08:43.288 --> 00:08:53.818 Uh, experiencing is maybe you have a a fast food restaurants that you go to frequently. I try not to go all the time or a restaurant that you like to go to. 95 00:08:53.818 --> 00:09:07.769 Um, those, those establishments are often not posting signs that the inside is closed, or they're, they're only open certain days of the week or their head of shut down. 96 00:09:07.769 --> 00:09:13.708 Um, I had a friend say they tried to go through mcdonald's drive through the other day and. 97 00:09:13.708 --> 00:09:21.808 They got to the point to order, and they said, we can't take any orders. We don't have any kitchen staff. Nobody, nobody showed up. Um, so. 98 00:09:21.808 --> 00:09:26.729 We're really at this point, I'm dealing with. aa 00:09:26.729 --> 00:09:31.048 In economic environment, or wages are increasing. 100 00:09:31.048 --> 00:09:38.038

Um, among the jobs that we are the labor market, where we are competing as well, so. 101 00:09:38.038 --> 00:09:44.668 1 example that we provide where we track data is. 102 00:09:44.668 --> 00:09:47.938 Uh, with our residential services, we have. 103 00:09:47.938 --> 00:09:55.769 A open referral database, we call it and that is individuals who have been approved. 104 00:09:55.769 --> 00:10:00.899 For the comprehensive waiver and need to find a residential provider. 105 00:10:00.899 --> 00:10:04.229 And they are. 106 00:10:04.229 --> 00:10:07.948 This meeting someone to provide their care. 107 00:10:07.948 --> 00:10:12.119 That has climbed from. 108 00:10:12.119 --> 00:10:18.599 In July, we had around 200 individuals to now we have over 517. 109 00:10:18.599 --> 00:10:21.749 Individuals to are approved. 110 00:10:21.749 --> 00:10:26.519 For services, they have a slot, they just are not able to have a provider. 111 00:10:26.519 --> 00:10:30.178 Um, accept them because the provider does not have any staff. 112 00:10:30.178 --> 00:10:35.908 I can't hire any staff to at the, the wage that they're able to pay.

00:10:35.908 --> 00:10:45.328 So this is something that we are working to address through the governor's rate recommendations, which I'll talk about later. 114 00:10:45.328 --> 00:10:51.839 Um, but I did want to talk about kind of just the general access to care environment that we're experiencing. 115 00:10:51.839 --> 00:10:58.828 Right now, and, um, the issues that, that that is causing many of those individuals that are. 116 00:10:58.828 --> 00:11:03.119 Waiting for residential services are in a hospital. 117 00:11:03.119 --> 00:11:09.448 And with no place to go, or they're in an unsafe family situation. 118 00:11:09.448 --> 00:11:18.269 So those are all things that we will be bringing to the general assembly as well as the issues with. 119 00:11:18.269 --> 00:11:21.629 Access in the transportation service. 120 00:11:21.629 --> 00:11:25.678 When you can't get transportation service, it's. 121 00:11:25.678 --> 00:11:35.219 It's a little bit different, because it affects every area. You can't get transportation then you can't get to your other services and so. 122 00:11:35.219 --> 00:11:44.399 It leads to negative experiences beyond just the transportation itself so that's something we really want to. 123 00:11:44.399 --> 00:11:47.458 Help everyone understand as we go through. 124 00:11:47.458 --> 00:11:53.609 Uh, the budget process this year, and with that, I'm going to turn it over to.

125 00:11:53.609 --> 00:12:01.828 Sheila wanting who's our assistant division director in the eastern region covers the St Louis metro area. 126 00:12:01.828 --> 00:12:06.629 Um, and beyond to talk about kind of what what she's been regionally. 127 00:12:07.798 --> 00:12:18.629 Stress and thank you to everyone who's taken the time to join us today. I know I've talked to several of you over the course of the last few weeks and. 128 00:12:18.894 --> 00:12:28.764 Again, I want everyone to realize just how much we understand how this impacts you. How it impacts the folks that we serve. 129 00:12:29.274 --> 00:12:39.173 I started my career back in 996 in case management and I know just 1st hand how people value their jobs and value their day programs. 130 00:12:39.173 --> 00:12:51.563 And, you know, I realize that when we lose transportation, sometimes that means that they just can't go to those programs or get to work. And I know that that's just devastating. 131 00:12:51.563 --> 00:13:04.494 And I know that it really also impacts the family, and it even impacts the need for other services too. So I appreciate you taking the time to, to join and help us talk about this a little bit. 132 00:13:06.028 --> 00:13:10.943 Um, just kind of talking about transportation services in St. Louis. 133 00:13:10.943 --> 00:13:11.214 Now, 134 00:13:11.214 --> 00:13:15.354 I think we look back when we 1st started seeing a capacity issue, 135 00:13:15.354 --> 00:13:26.573 in the seamless area was in the fall of 2018 and at that time we lost a large transportation provider we were able to secure a new provider who picked up several routes.

136 00:13:26.573 --> 00:13:38.092 And we worked within our existing network, identified some other routes and and since that time we've added a few additional providers, and they've picked up some of those routes. 137 00:13:38.092 --> 00:13:42.624 But we started keeping a waiting list of individuals who had funded for transportation. 138 00:13:44.908 --> 00:13:59.278 But didn't have a provider back in the fall of 18 and we actually still today have some individuals on that waiting list who've been waiting for transportation since we lost that provider back in 18. 139 00:13:59.278 --> 00:13:59.849 Um, 140 00:14:00.443 --> 00:14:07.703 since then we've continued to approve new requests for transportation services and sometimes, 141 00:14:07.703 --> 00:14:08.394 whenever, 142 00:14:08.423 --> 00:14:08.724 you know, 143 00:14:08.724 --> 00:14:09.774 those go through, 144 00:14:09.803 --> 00:14:09.984 um, 145 00:14:10.014 --> 00:14:12.894 we are able to secure a provider for that route, 146 00:14:12.953 --> 00:14:16.703 but sometimes we can't and they're added to that waiting list as well. 147 00:14:18.203 --> 00:14:33.024

With that waiting list, we do just periodically push that out to all of our providers and and try to to work with providers to develop new routes. But at this time we have a total of 171 individuals on that waiting list. 148 00:14:35.663 --> 00:14:49.193 Additionally, we have had more recently lost in the fall. Actually 2021, we lost 2 providers that primarily worked in the St, Charles County area and there were 56 writers impacted by that. 149 00:14:49.193 --> 00:15:00.203 Most of those individuals are now on the waitlist. Most recently we received a notice of termination from another large provider here that serves primarily St Louis county. 150 00:15:00.203 --> 00:15:14.783 Initially they were going to in services for some folks on the 20th of January and others at the end of February. They have actually agreed to extend that termination date through April 30th. 151 00:15:14.783 --> 00:15:29.423 So we have an additional 114 writers that rely on that transportation provider that do have pending termination notices. So that's just kind of an overview of where we are right now. 152 00:15:33.293 --> 00:15:40.884 And we did form a local work group that consists of folks from the division. 153 00:15:41.303 --> 00:15:55.884 Some of our existing transportation providers some of our other service providers that are impacted by transportation. And also, some of our, our partners with our local boards are seamless county St Louis city. 154 00:15:55.913 --> 00:16:08.484 And Jefferson County and St, Charles County boards have all been been working with us, you know, and we're looking at this problem as a region and seeing how we can work together to find some solutions. 155 00:16:09.173 --> 00:16:12.953 So we did start meeting back in October of last year. 156 00:16:13.854 --> 00:16:23.874

And I just want to share some of the barriers that the providers our initial meeting really was focused on what are the barriers, you know, kind of how what are we facing right now? 157 00:16:24.923 --> 00:16:33.533 And a lot of our providers share that they are struggling to keep up with recruitment and retention as, 158 00:16:33.563 --> 00:16:35.274 as Jess was talking about, 159 00:16:35.274 --> 00:16:35.634 you know, 160 00:16:35.634 --> 00:16:37.464 as we've seen this, 161 00:16:38.514 --> 00:16:53.394 this labor shortage a lot of the private sector has been able to respond more quickly with increases in rates of pay hourly rates of pay and so it's been harder for our transportation providers to hire drivers and keep the drivers that they've 162 00:16:53.394 --> 00:16:53.903 had. 163 00:16:54.384 --> 00:17:00.024 So, that's a lot of what we've talked about. They've also seen some other increased expenses to. 164 00:17:00.448 --> 00:17:04.648 Particularly with insurance recently. 165 00:17:04.648 --> 00:17:15.838 But they've talked about just truly right now several of them have fleet vehicles that are just setting and lots and they just don't have drivers for them. Um. 166 00:17:15.838 --> 00:17:23.159 1 of the providers that we work with subcontracts, and sometimes they use rideshare Lyft and Uber. 167 00:17:23.159 --> 00:17:27.959

And they're reporting that they are not able to subcontract out with. 168 00:17:28.104 --> 00:17:32.814 Lived in Uber right now, because they're always operating under search pricing. 169 00:17:32.814 --> 00:17:47.453 So, current rates don't cover that and additionally, even even if that weren't the case, because Uber and Lyft also have shortages, they can't count on those ride shares now to provide dependent transportation. Right, right. 170 00:17:47.453 --> 00:17:53.544 When we need it, and most of our folks have very specific times where they need to get where where they're supposed to be. 171 00:17:54.534 --> 00:18:06.294 So, we've as a group, in addition to looking at those barriers, we've also met with staff from the division to look at our and Jess is going to talk a little bit more about the Mercer rate review. 172 00:18:06.804 --> 00:18:21.384 But 1 of our meetings, we devoted to looking at the results of that rate review and then the providers then had an opportunity to give feedback for consideration as we finalize that review. 173 00:18:21.384 --> 00:18:27.023 And so we sent out a survey. So, some some providers responded individually. Some kind of. 174 00:18:27.388 --> 00:18:41.459 Responded to us, and then we sent that in collectively, but we were able to take that information we gathered from that work group and incorporate that into to recommendations from that right review. So that was very helpful. 175 00:18:42.294 --> 00:18:57.144 We haven't met yet this year. We were really waiting on the recommendations from the governor's office for the budget. For 23. we are scheduling our next meeting and we're really now going to be focused on next steps for the group. 176 00:18:57.144 --> 00:19:05.483 We're trying to take a multifaceted approach and really look at any short term solutions where we can maybe creatively.

We also. 179 00:19:28.378 --> 00:19:33.808 Wanted to think the St Louis in St Charles area. 180 00:19:33.808 --> 00:19:37.259 And other transportation providers that participated. 181 00:19:37.259 --> 00:19:43.378 And giving us feedback on the rate study that we conducted recently, because that. 182 00:19:43.378 --> 00:19:46.949 What helped shape the governor's recommendations. 183 00:19:46.949 --> 00:20:00.568 For such a large rate increase in the coming fiscal year, for transportation providers, and we know that no 1 really has extra time in the day right now to do that sort of thing. So it's really. 184 00:20:00.568 --> 00:20:11.999 Um, out of their sense of advocacy, and just doing this for the right reasons that they spend the time doing that and providing that level of feedback for us. So. 185 00:20:11.999 --> 00:20:16.499 And say, I appreciate that 1st, um, I do want to talk about. 186 00:20:16.499 --> 00:20:22.138 What that rate study consisted of as well as the governor's rate recommendations. 187 00:20:22.138 --> 00:20:25.378 For the the coming year. 188

Um, so every provider submitted their cost analysis. 197 00:21:29.699 --> 00:21:39.929 Of what they thought their transportation was going to cost, and they submitted that to 30, 40 different people. 198 00:21:39.929 --> 00:21:48.503 Who all analyzed and worked with them on what that rate would be. Um, some of our transportation providers have been with us for decades. 199 00:21:48.804 --> 00:21:58.314

And so after those initial rates were set, the only way to garner additional funds or to increase those rates was through budget allocation. 200 00:21:58.648 --> 00:22:01.648 Cost of living adjustments or other methodology. 201 00:22:01.648 --> 00:22:06.808 And so we now have a massive. 202 00:22:06.808 --> 00:22:10.378 Range of rates from, um. 203 00:22:10.378 --> 00:22:20.574 You know, a dollar a mile to, you know, just you can imagine with so many different people establishing rates and so many different providers using their own rate methodology. 204 00:22:20.993 --> 00:22:32.124 Um, it it was really a challenge when we started looking at it to try to come up with some commonalities with our existing transportation providers to help. 205 00:22:32.429 --> 00:22:38.068 Provide research to the, the independent rate study. 206 00:22:38.364 - > 00:22:48.443So that was almost having to start completely from scratch with that independent entity, looking at best practice and what other states were doing. 207 00:22:48.773 --> 00:22:49.463 Um, 208 00:22:49.554 --> 00:22:55.523 it we couldn't holistically say 50% of our transportation providers do transportation ex, 209 00:22:55.554 --> 00:22:58.973 because there's so many methods from mileage to rate, 210 00:22:58.973 --> 00:22:59.903 uh,

211 00:22:59.963 --> 00:23:04.134 per mile per trip per zone different zones. 212 00:23:04.163 --> 00:23:13.193 There's such a wide variety of the way we do it now that, um, coming up with 1 method was super challenging to to leap into the future for consistency. 213 00:23:14.398 --> 00:23:17.878 So so now. 214 00:23:17.878 --> 00:23:22.618 We're working with the Mercer on a new rate study is. 215 00:23:22.618 --> 00:23:28.828 Just said, and the, the current proposal is a zone method. 216 00:23:28.828 --> 00:23:32.729 Which is 6 zones are. 217 00:23:32.844 --> 00:23:47.574 3 zones for people who do not need ambulatory assistants and 3 zones for people who do need ambulatory assistants, meaning they need modified vehicles, which obviously has an additional expense to that rate. 218 00:23:48.084 --> 00:23:58.763 So each zone has a specified number of miles that fits into that zone zone. 1 is 1 to 10 zone. 2 is 11 to 20 zone. 3 is 20 plus. 219 00:23:59.068 --> 00:24:12.743 Um, and so that seemed to fit into the majority if you can say, we have a majority, it meant a lot of how we are doing transportation with existing providers, but there's so many outliers outside of that. 220 00:24:12.773 --> 00:24:17.003 Um, but that is the working model that Mercer is evaluating for us. 221 00:24:20.398 --> 00:24:24.628 Thanks so much fun. 348 00:35:30.954 --> 00:35:38.543 So it's really what's been successful is in the local areas that we're really working with who they're. 349 00:35:38.789 --> 00:35:49.048 Their colleagues and counterparts there are providing transportation for other services, or in public transportation in order to put together a package. 350 00:35:49.764 --> 00:35:54.503 Depending on the needs of the individuals that that are living in their area, 351 00:35:54.864 --> 00:35:55.764 for example, 352 00:35:55.764 --> 00:35:57.202 in the leg of the Ozarks, 353 00:35:58.164 --> 00:36:10.793 there was a not for profit that was formed called lake of the Ozarks transportation council and it was developed to promote develop and operate or fund mass transportation related to the facilities, 354 00:36:10.793 --> 00:36:12.833 and the programs in the lake area. 355 00:36:13.253 --> 00:36:18.083 The partners in that endeavor are the Senate bill, 356 00:36:18.083 --> 00:36:21.233 40 boards of Camden Miller and Morgan counties, 357 00:36:21.592 --> 00:36:35.393 and they are partnering with the local public transportation provider to expand the opportunities for services and transportation in their major cities in their areas and really are targeting. 358 00:36:35.639 --> 00:36:47.034 Um, what the individual needs are of the of the folks that live in the area, whether it's getting to work, um, getting to day programs and it's evening hours. Some people need evening hours.
